It is for me an absolute pleasure to be hosting the 34th International Olympiad in Informatics (IOI 2022) in Indonesia for the first time.

First Team Arrived: Ukraine

Pright clouds in the sky of Yogyakarta welcomed the first day of the 34th International Olympiad of informatics (IOI) event. The pandemic situation did not seem to dampen the enthusiasm of 269 participants from 70 teams when they landed at Yogyakarta International Airport, Kulon Progo, yesterday. Although exhausted from the flight, bright smiles still emanated from the young and intelligent students who come to compete to be the best in the world of informatics.

"(The trip was) a bit long," said participant from Iceland, Kirill Zolotuskiy (18). According to Kirill, the IOI event is not only about competition but there are other things that are no less important. "I think it's a good opportunity to meet new people and to learn new experiences and to see different cultures. It is my first time visiting Asia," said Kirill.



Optimism was also shown by Jona Bedoux from Team Netherlands. "Our team is fun, good, and will win," he said with a smile. Jona said he was looking forward to the excursion activity ahead.

The Ukrainian team was the first team to register on August 4. Their impression of Yogyakarta was very beautiful and pleasant. The spicy food, the friendliness of the local people, and the hot tropical weather were unforgettable experiences for them. "We've been walking around tasting Indonesian food. We love the fried rice, the wide variety of seafood, and foods that we can't even name. We were impressed when we visited the Indonesia Air Force Museum," explained Roman Yanushevakyi (17).

Meanwhile, according to Oleh Naver (17), the Ukrainian team has done its best in preparation for IOI. They have been preparing for two weeks. "We did joint training in Poland, we also participated in the Central European Informatics Olympiad. If we add the training that we do independently, our preparation is almost the whole year. Our difficulty is that we don't have special school subjects, "Oleh explained. Ukrainian Team Leader, Anton Tsypko described their team members as being quite a strong team. "They have a strong desire to win. The only drawback is the unstable situation," said Anton.

At the airport, the IOI participants received traditional patterned shawls and were greeted with the Kulon Progo Angguk dance. The participants then headed to the Rich Yogyakarta hotel for registration and rapid antigen testing. IOI participants from various cultures and backgrounds are encouraged to adhere to the code of ethics, which promotes tolerance and respect for participants from other countries.

Practice Session



The International Olympiad in Informatics (IOI) is the most prestigious computer science competition for secondary school and high school students around the world. After two years of being held online due to the Covid-19 pandemic, this year IOI will be the first competition to be held on a hybrid basis (online and offline).

On a separate occasion, Acting Head of the National Achievement Center (Puspresnas) of the Ministry of Education, Culture, Research, and Technology (Kemendikbudristek) Asep Sukmayadi revealed the importance of organizing IOI in creating young talents in the field of Technology, Information and Communication (ICT). "We want to create young leaders who become inspirations for their people so that these talents are not extinguished in the middle of the road. This competition is an encouragement and a field for self-actualization for them," said Asep, in Jakarta (7th August).

Entering the 2nd day (8/8) of IOI, all participants will meet for the first time in the practice session which starts from 14.00 – 16.00 Jakarta Time. Host Scientific Committee Chair of IOI, Jonathan Irvin Gunawan explained the importance of participating in practice sessions. "Practice session is an opportunity for participants to try the competition system used and report complaints (if any) to the committee," said Irvin.

Irvin added regarding the technical implementation of the practice session, namely that participants will use the competition system used and solve several test questions. "Their scores (the participants) in this session will not affect their results in the future," concluded Irvin.


